Course(s) Title: English 3 – Grade 11

Course Description:

This one-year course designed for students in eleventh grade addresses the California state content standards in reading, writing, listening and speaking and is intended to prepare students for the rigors of any four-year university English program.

This course emphasizes the importance of critical thinking and research and writing as they pertain to the Aspire goal of "College for Certain":

Typical Activities:

- Read silently with a purpose
- Write in a private journal
- Read and discuss works of literature in large and small groups, using Aspire-approved texts
- Study grammar and mechanics and apply what is gleaned to a variety of genres of writing
- Write and revise compositions in the following genres:
 - o Rhetorical/Persuasive/Expository
 - Narrative (both fictional and autobiographical)
 - o Literary Response and Analysis
 - o Descriptive
 - o End-of-the-year Exhibition
- Take multiple-choice, free-response, and cloze exams and write in-class "timed-write" essays
- Craft creative works such as screenplays, puppet shows, original songs, youtube videos and more that demonstrate high-order thinking, ingenuity and presentation skills
- Study the art of pedagogy so that you can effectively teach others
- Consider deeply the eleven guiding questions

Grading Breakdown:

- 30% Class work and Positive Class Participation (Present, Punctual, Prepared and Participatory)
- 10% Homework
- 60% Essays, Exams and Projects

Note that essays and projects fall into two categories and are hence worth more.

Late assignments are not accepted. If you are absent on the day a large essay or project is due, you will be expected to make arrangements to turn in those assignments before or during your absence. For further clarification, visit webstaclecourse.com.

Students who are absent MUST come in after school or e-mail Ms. Kittelson within three days of their absence in order to find out what class assignments (not essays, anticipated exams or projects) were missed. There is not sufficient time during class to catch up students who were previously absent. Students should <u>also</u> visit the website.
